Farewell to Fraser Jackson

We are sad to record that U3A Tawa will shortly be losing longstanding member **Fraser Jackson**, to Auckland. Fraser is a man with a stellar academic and business consultancy background, but in U3A, many will have valued and profited from his membership of the Current Affairs group.

The group can usually muster around 30 participants and one can only be impressed with the wide range of skills they can collectively claim. There is rarely a subject raised where there isn't someone in the room who can speak effectively and persuasively on it, no matter how challenging.

Despite his erudite background, Fraser wears it very lightly. His mode of operation is to listen intently to others and then to gently introduce a refined overview and analysis of the issues involved. Overstatements are quietly brought down to earth. Economically questionable propositions are weighed and lovingly discarded. Fraser is not at all dogmatic and is the first to accept that nobody knows everything and the information we have is increasingly imperfect especially when we are addressing wholly novel situations.

One instance will suffice. Ever since the major lockdown (for Covid) a debate has been growing as to whether the Government should have been more influenced by the budgetary considerations or the health and humanitarian ones. Fraser has never suggested that economics are irrelevant. Rather he has suggested that the Government, in putting a high value on the health of the nation is at the same time laying the groundwork for a better quality of community-based economic recovery; viewed in the wider sense. The virus is new. We must first know better what we are up against, rather than apply some ruthless economic 'rules' and expect Covid to behave like just another 'predictable' market force.

The group will be losing a highly tuned specialist with a wide range of personal interests that revere our NZ natural heritage. As group leader, Dave Smith observes: "It was only recently that I learned that Fraser is an Emeritus Professor in Econometrics. Had I known that four years ago I might have been inclined to measure my words a good deal more carefully than I did! Thank goodness that (a) he never let on and (b) he's a damn good sport. We shall miss him. Tawa's loss in Auckland's gain".
